## Jeanette Bergeron Retires

In January of 1999, an academic search committee drawn from professional archivists, historians, and members of the Board of the James R. Crumley Jr Archives, hired a Phi Beta Kappa professional archivist with extensive consulting and contractual experience - for a one-year contract at nine hours a week.

Fifteen and a half years later, Jeanette Bergeron is retiring from her position as the full-time Archivist of the Crumley Archives, a repository she has built into the premier regional archives of the ELCA.

At the time of her hiring, Jeanette brought with her an almost unbelievable depth of talent and experience. As a magna cum laude graduate of Furman University and with two Masters Degrees from the University of South Carolina, she had already consulted or contracted with historic repositories ranging from the Historic Charleston Foundation, the Episcopal Diocese of Upper South Carolina, the Vietnam Veterans of America South Carolina State Council, Bankers Trust and the South Carolina Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism. As company archivist, Jeanette introduced the Internet to Colonial Life & Accident Insurance Company, at a time when the Internet was an almost totally unfamiliar professional tool. Directing the archives of an oil and gas exploration institute (ESRI) which worked with international oil companies including BP, Exxon, and Shell, provided Jeanette the opportunity to work with people in Antarctica, Argentina and the former Soviet republics.



Over the years, Jeanette has built an outstanding professional reputation. She has served as President of the South Carolina Archival Association and President of the South Carolina Library Association. Her numerous awards include the Archives Award of Merit from the South Carolina State Historical Records Advisory Board and the F. William Summers Outstanding Alumnus Award from the University of South Carolina College of Library and Information Science. She has made presentations to the State Historical Records Advisory Board and the Special Libraries Association in San Antonio, Los Angeles and New York City, among many others.

During her time at the Crumley Archives, Jeanette has organized, catalogued, managed, digitized, and renovated. On a daily, weekly and monthly basis, she has fielded hundreds of historical inquiries, located missing blueprints and documents, created historical displays for synod assemblies and campus events, and traveled throughout Region 9, helping congregations establish, restore, or recover their own archival collections. Her *Manual for Church Archives & Recordkeeping*, which she has regularly updated since 1999, stands as the gold standard for congregations seeking to preserve their history.

In addition to her many other responsibilities, for the last decade Jeanette has patiently, professionally and with grace and humor guided almost every senior Lutheran student passing through the doors of Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary through their final project for the required class, *Lutheranism in North America*, giving students a window into the joys, surprises - and occasional frustrations - of historical research. Each of these students, now spread throughout the ELCA, has taken with them a deeper insight into a particular historical person, event or congregation, a copy of the *Manual for Church Archives*, and most importantly, a deeper understanding of the importance of how history shapes the present - and the important role rostered leaders play in preserving those stories.

Jeanette has many plans for her "retirement" years. She is considering offering her services to the other ELCA regional archives, both to share some of what she has learned over the years and to provide an opportunity for travel (perhaps finding along the way a new place to live that has much lower humidity than Columbia). She hopes to use her 25 years of experience presiding and serving on boards and councils to serve on a historical board or commission in South Carolina. And on a more personal note, she has bought a new piano to feed her love of music, plans to renovate some furniture inherited from her great grandparents, and intends to add a pergola to her backyard.

The Archives Board is currently making plans to publicly honor Jeanette for her years of service. Since that fortuitous search for a nine-hour a week contractual archivist in 1999, Jeanette Bergeron has become the face, the heart, the voice and the passion of the James R. Crumley Jr. Archives. By insuring the preservation of the documents and records that tell over three centuries worth of stories, she has lovingly preserved the legacy of southern Lutheranism for the future. In doing so, she has left a large legacy of her own. For generations to come, the congregations, institutions and people of Region 9 of the ELCA will be in her debt. ♦ *Susan McArver*

## Treasures from the Archives:

### *From Tables to Textstone: A Look at the Seminary Auxiliary* Dr. Susan Wilds McArver

In 1934, in the midst of the Great Depression, a letter appeared in the July edition of the *North Carolina Lutheran* written by Pastor H. A. McCullough, outlining a dire financial situation. For the past several years, Southern Seminary had been running a deficit of \$5,000.00 a year (a huge amount in 1934), a deficit about to reach a point of no return. Salaries, insurance premiums and other expenses were coming due, but in the hard times facing all, the supporting synods had no more funds to send. Could not each pastor, asked McCullough, become a "committee of one . . . to extend the influence of the Seminary, to seek . . . immediate contributions towards current support"?


McCullough's call awakened an impassioned response from Mary McClanahan Holland, widow of the Rev. Robert C. Holland, and a long time supporter of missions in the southern Lutheran church. The very next month, the *North Carolina Lutheran* published "An Appeal," in which she pointedly took McCullough's plea and personalized it.

McClanahan Holland


Holland suggested an appeal "not from the Faculty or Board," but "from the Women to the Women of our Southern Church . . . Could there be a more opportune time to launch what is felt would be a very great help – a Women's League of our Southern Theological Seminary in Columbia, S.C.?" Would women throughout the southeast contribute just a small amount, "probably one dollar," toward the support of the Seminary? She ended by writing, "We call for volunteers – would you be a charter member?"

Almost by return mail, Mrs. Holland received a letter from Beulah Lyerly. "With this letter, she wrote, "find my dollar. Please put me down as a charter member for the Seminary Woman's League. I think it a splendid work and I hope the women carry it out and make it count."



It took another six years for a formal organization to be effected, but on May 20, 1940, a "large group of women," formally organized the Women's Auxiliary of the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary.


The Auxiliary appealed to women spread across the Southeast, all united in their support of the "welfare and progress of the Seminary." The Auxiliary encouraged contributions by the purchasing of "memberships" – a dollar for regular members, with higher categories of membership available as well. In the first year of its life, 332 women became members at the \$1.00 level. Between 1943 and 1961, however, the total figure raised skyrocketed to \$65,178.17.



From the beginning, the Women's Auxiliary designated its funds for specific projects in, with - and literally even under - the seminary.

In the years following 1940, the Women's Auxiliary supported everything: no project seemed too large or too small. In fact, one could almost trace the history of the Seminary – and the changing culture - simply by examining the list of projects supported by the Women's Auxiliary.

While major projects in the 1960's included the textstone in Christ Chapel and the late 1970's brought major funding toward the refurbishing of Beam dormitory, it is the length and breadth of the smaller projects that gives one a true idea of the scope of their work. The Auxiliary has funded everything from the purchase of trash cans, paint, sidewalks, landscaping, knife sharpeners, screen doors, Venetian blinds, book shelves, and lighting systems to "furniture for 2 rooms for girl students," electric mixers, and plastic drinking glasses. They have supplied furnaces, boilers, stokers, circulating warm-air heating plants, and air conditioning units. Faculty have received tape recorders, opaque projectors, and a "rebuilt verity typewriter .

.. for use in Hebrew and Greek classes.” The Auxiliary paid for frying pans and water coolers, color televisions and hymn boards, pianos and game tables. The Auxiliary even paid for the historical marker still found in the middle of the country near Pomaria, marking the original site of Southern Seminary.



A special project that brought much pride to the organization was the creation of the needlepoint kneelers around the altar of Christ Chapel. The kneelers, designed by Professor Richard Hoefler and student Mike Knutson, and stitched by dozens of women across the region, were a massive undertaking proudly presented to the Seminary in 1980.

Seminary Auxiliary over all of these years. The Crumley Archives is proud to serve as the repository of its history. ♦

Organized on May 20, 1940 — by Mrs. Edgar C. Cooper (wife of the president of the Seminary at that time) at the Seminary with 110 women enrolled.

- Installation of adequate stoker in main building of Seminary.
- Installation of sidewalks on campus 100 feet of 4-foot wide sidewalks around main building.
- Installation of equipment for kitchen (\$3,700.00).

The Scholarship Loan Fund began in 1954 by a gift of \$300.00 from Mrs. F. M. Sprague of Cherryville, N. C.

In more recent years, the Auxiliary has supported the work of the Crumley Archives itself, the holder of its historical records, by paying for a student worker and for other materials that the budget could not provide.

In short, since its founding, the Women's Auxiliary has provided all of the little things – and many of the big ones – that make seminary life more than just the barest essentials. As seminary president H. George Anderson wrote in 1980, “the Auxiliary has often meant the difference between mediocrity and excellence” for the seminary.

By 1980, the term “Women's” had been dropped, and the organization became “The Auxiliary of Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary.” Between 2000 and 2005 alone, the Auxiliary collected over \$288,000. It is hard to imagine what the seminary would look like today without the contributions of the women of the

## Historic Frederick Church records arrive in Archives By Jeanette Bergeron

The congregation of Frederick Church in St. Thomas, U.S. Virgin Islands, has transferred its historic collection into the care of the James R. Crumley Jr. Archives of Region 9. Founded in 1666 by Danish Pastor Keld Jensen, Frederick Church lays claim to being the oldest, continuously functioning Lutheran congregation in the Western Hemisphere.



Archivist Jeanette Bergeron initially trained Jim McKee and other volunteers who worked with the Frederick collection on-site. Conversations to transfer the rare materials to an archival environment more protected from annual hurricane threats began 16 years ago and culminated recently under the leadership of interim senior pastor Rev. Dr. Callon W. Holloway, a former ELCA bishop experienced in working with the Regional Archives.

The materials arrived in Columbia the first week of September and will be kept in quarantine for a period of time. The congregation is working on a second shipment of anniversary books, artifacts, photographs, freedom papers and church records from the 1700s. As part of its upcoming 350th Anniversary, the congregation is also hoping to repatriate its records that were taken to Denmark and place them with the other materials. ♦

## Service to Congregations on the Upswing

The Archives serves a multitude of people every year by caring directly for their organization's historical records or teaching them how to do it locally, by helping them find photographs and answers to their questions, and by assisting them with anniversary celebrations and the writing of church history.

In recent years, our audience has shifted. As with most Archives, it used to be largely genealogists. We still serve our fair share because so many American families passed through the Carolinas on their way west. Genealogy service is time-consuming to search for variously spelled names in semi-legible books, sometimes in German. In fact, we have to put a cap on how much of this work we can do for people. They are always welcome to visit and conduct their own research.

Increasingly, we are serving the ELCA itself, specifically its congregations. You can see below that congregations are calling us asking, "What are the most important documents for us to keep?" and "How do we take care of this?" Or "We want to celebrate a service like it was done in 1912—do you have the liturgy?" Yes, we can help with all of that and more. From these congregational interactions, we are even building better historical files on the congregations of our region.

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## Synod, Congregation and Individual to be Honored at Annual Banquet

### *Florida-Bahamas Synod*

On January 15, 1929, at Jacksonville, the Florida Conference of the Georgia Synod of the United Lutheran Church in America (ULCA) reconstituted itself as the Florida Synod of the ULCA, one of the predecessor churches of the Lutheran Church in America (LCA). The LCA's Florida Synod was constituted on October 1-2, 1962. The new synod brought together congregations of the ULCA, Augustana, Finnish Evangelical, and the American Evangelical Lutheran Churches. Elected the first president of the LCA's Florida Synod was the Rev. Royall Yount. He had served as synod president in the ULCA's Florida Synod since his election in 1950 and served as bishop until his retirement in July 1987. On January 1, 1988, the Florida-Bahamas Synod, Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) was formed, bringing together the Florida-Bahamas Conference of the American Lutheran Church (ALC), the Florida Synod of the LCA, and the Florida portions of the Association of Evangelical Lutheran Church's (AELC) Atlantic District. Former bishops of the Florida-Bahamas Synod include Lavern Franzen, William Trexler, and Edward Benoway. Current bishop is Robert Schaefer, serving with 186 congregations, 61,836 baptized members, 407 ordained ministers, and 28 lay rostered leaders.

### *St. John's Lutheran Church, Charleston, SC*

St. John's Lutheran Church, Charleston, is known as the "Mother Church of Lutheranism" in Charleston and in South Carolina. The congregation dates from 1742 with the arrival of the "father of the Lutheran Church in America," Dr. Henry Melchior Muhlenberg, who was on his way to the Salzburger colony at Ebenezer, Georgia. On his return he spent three weeks waiting for a ship to Philadelphia and during that time taught and conducted services. Subsequently the congregation was organized and a building completed in 1763. The present building was dedicated in 1818. There have been many outstanding pastors of St. John's but the Rev. Dr. John Bachman (served 1815-1874) stands out. He was a friend and collaborator of John James Audubon. Bachman was a driving force in the establishment of the Lutheran Synod of South Carolina (1824); the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary (1830); and Newberry College (1856). St. John's continues in its active role today in Charleston.

### *Senator Ernest F. "Fritz" Hollings*

Sen. Hollings was born in 1922 in Charleston and has been a long-term member of St. John's Lutheran Church. He attended school in Charleston and graduated from The Citadel. His accomplishments are legion and a selected few are:

1. **Served in combat** during World War II 1942-45 and was awarded the Bronze Star.
2. **Governor of South Carolina** 1959-63. During his term he stressed education and was instrumental in establishing the Technical Colleges in South Carolina. He also stressed the War on Hunger and the awareness of poverty in the state.
3. **U.S. Senator** 1966-2005. A long-term Democrat he served for 39 years and is the 8th longest-serving senator.
4. For the **Lutheran Church in America** (LCA) he served on the Board of Pensions 1956-62 and in 1958 he and his family were on the cover of *The Lutheran*. From 1962-68 he was on the **LCA Executive Council**.
5. Now in his 90's he continues as a member of St. John's and writes articles and editorials, plays tennis, and raises money for the **Hollings Cancer Center at the Medical University of South Carolina**.
